BYE-LAWS

In exercise of the powers conferred by Rule 6.5 of the Rules and Regulations of the International Institute for Population Sciences, the Executive Council hereby makes the following Bye-Laws, namely:

PART I – GENERAL BYE-LAW

1. SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT

- i) These Bye-Laws may be called the International Institute for Population Sciences Bye-Laws.
- ii) They shall be deemed to have come into force on 11-08-2022.

2. DEFINITIONS

In these Rules, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context:

- i) **"The Institute"** means the International Institute for Population Sciences, Mumbai;
- ii) **"Government"** means the Central Government;
- iii) **"The General Council"** means the General Council of the Institute, established under these Rules and Regulations;
- iv) **"The Executive Council"** means the Executive Council of the Institute, constituted under these Rules and Regulations, to manage the day to day affairs of the Institute;
- v) **"The Academic Council"** means the Academic Council of the Institute, constituted under these Rules and Regulations;
- vi) **"Standing Finance Committee"** means the Standing Finance Committee of the Institute, constituted under Rules and Regulations of the Institute;

- vii) **"Board of Studies"** means the Board of Studies of the Institute, constituted under Rules and Regulations of the Institute;
- viii) **"President"** means the President of the General Council of the Institute;
- ix) **"Vice-President"** means the Vice-President of the General Council of the Institute;
- x) **"Chairperson"** means the Chairperson of the Executive Council of the Institute, unless otherwise specified;
- xi) **"Secretary"** means the Secretary of Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Government of India;
- xii) **"Director"** means the Director and Senior Professor of the International Institute for Population Sciences;
- xiii) **"Registrar"** means the Chief Administrative Officer-cum-Registrar of the International Institute for Population Sciences;
- xiv) **"Year"** means the year ending on 31st March;
- xv) **"Member"** means a Member of the General Council, Executive Council, Academic Council, Standing Finance Committee and Board of Studies, or any such other authorities as may be declared by the Rules to the authorities of the Institute.
- xvi) **"Act"** means the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 [Act 3 of 1956].
- xvii) **"Campus"** means Campus of the Institute at its headquarters, wherein its major facilities, faculty, staff, students and its Academic Departments are located in a city/ town/ village in India. While 'off-Campus centre' means as approved (by the Central Government) centre of the Institute beyond its Campus and outside India;
- xviii) **"Appointing Authority"** in relation to any post under the Institute means the authority competent to make appointments to the post;
- xix) **"Employee"** means a person serving in the Institute on any post;

Employees are further divided into two categories, viz., (a) Academic Staff and (b) Non-Academic Staff.

- (a) Academic Staff includes
 - i. Members of the faculty, consisting of Director, Professors, Associate Professors and Assistant Professors.
 - ii. Any other category of staff declared as academic staff by the Executive Council.
- (b) Non-Academic staff will mean and include all other staff not covered in (i) and (ii) above.
- xx) **"Rules"** means the Rules and Regulations of the International Institute for Population Sciences; and
- xxi) **"Appendix"** means an Appendix to these Bye-Laws;

PART II - BYE LAWS FOR CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

1. MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

- i) The Executive Council shall ordinarily meet at the Institute on such date and time as per the convenience of the Chairperson, or any other person authorized to convene the meeting by the Chairperson as per the Rules and Regulations of the Institute.
- ii) An extraordinary meeting of the Executive Council shall also be called any time on a written requisition made by at least 5 members of the Executive Council.
- iii) The Member-Secretary shall send to the members notice of every meeting of the Executive Council at least 14 days in the case of an ordinary meeting and at least 7 days in the case of an extraordinary meeting, before the date of the meeting, under certificate of posting, or by speed post or by email. The agenda of the meeting shall be sent at least 5 days before the date of the meeting.
- iv) The Chairperson shall preside over the meeting of the Executive Council. In his/ her absence, a member chosen by the members present on the occasion shall function as the Chairperson of the meeting.
- v) Any member desirous of moving any resolution at a meeting of the Executive Council shall give notice thereof in writing to the Chairperson, so as to reach him/ her not less than 4 days before the date of such meeting. Such notice when received shall be circulated immediately to the members and be included in the agenda of the meeting.
- vi) Any matter not included in the agenda and of which notice as mentioned in sub-para (iii) & (v) above has not been given, may be considered at meeting of the Executive Council with the permission of the Chairperson.
- vii) The proceedings of meetings of the Executive Council shall be recorded in a Minute Book to be maintained by the Member-Secretary for the purpose after it is approved by the Chairperson of the meeting.

2. **ACADEMIC COUNCIL**

1. The composition, powers and functions of the Academic Council will be governed by the Rules 8, 9 and 10 of the Rules and Regulations of the Institute.
2. A casual vacancy in the Academic Council may be filled by the Chairperson of the Academic Council by nomination.
3. Meeting of the Academic Council:
 - i) An extraordinary meeting of the Academic Council shall also be called on a written requisition made by atleast 7 members of the Academic Council.
 - ii) The Member-Secretary shall send to the members notice of every meeting of the Academic Council at least 14 days in the case of an ordinary meeting and atleast 7 days in the case of an extraordinary meeting, before the date of the meeting, under certificate of posting, or by speed post or by email. The agenda of the meeting shall be sent atleast 5 days before the date of the meeting.
 - iii) Any member desirous of moving any resolution at a meeting of the Academic Council shall give notice thereof in writing to the Chairperson so as to reach him/ her not less than 4 days before the date of such meeting. Such notice, when received, shall be circulated immediately to the members and shall be included in the agenda of the meeting.
 - iv) The Chairperson of the Academic Council shall preside over the meeting of the Academic Council. In his/ her absence, a member chosen by the members present on the occasion shall function as the Chairperson of the meeting.
 - v) Any matter not included in the agenda, may be considered at a meeting of the Academic Council with the permission of the Chairperson.
 - vi) The proceedings of the meetings of the Academic Council shall be recorded in a Minute Book to be maintained by the Member-Secretary for the purpose after it is approved by the Chairperson of the meeting.

3. STANDING FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. The composition, powers and functions of the Standing Finance Committee will be governed by the Rules 11, 12 and 13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Institute.
2. The term of office of nominated members of the Standing Finance Committee shall be three years. An outgoing member shall be eligible for re-nomination.
3. A casual vacancy in a Standing Finance Committee may be filled by the Chairperson of the Executive Council by nomination of a member of the Executive Council.
4. Meeting of the Standing Finance Committee
 - i) The Standing Finance Committee shall ordinarily meet at the Institute on such date and time as the Chairperson, or any other person authorized by the Chairperson to convene the meeting in terms of the relevant provisions of these Rules and Regulations of the Institute.
 - ii) An extraordinary meeting of the Standing Finance Committee shall also be called on a written requisition made by atleast 4 members of the Standing Finance Committee.
 - iii) The Member-Secretary shall send to the members notice of every meeting of the Standing Finance Committee atleast 14 days in the case of an ordinary meeting and atleast 7 days in the case of an extraordinary meeting, before the date of the meeting, under certificate of posting, by speed post or by email. The agenda of the meeting shall be sent atleast 5 days before the date of the meeting.
 - iv) The Chairperson shall preside over the meeting of the Standing Finance Committee. In his/ her absence, a member chosen by the members present on the occasion shall function as Chairperson of the meeting.
 - v) Any member desirous of moving any resolution at a meeting of the Standing Finance Committee shall give notice thereof in writing, so as to reach him/ her not less than 4 days before the date of such meeting. Such notice when received shall be

circulated immediately to the members and shall be included in the agenda of the meeting.

- vi) Any matter not included in the agenda and of which notice as mentioned in sub-para (iii) & (v) above has not been given, may be considered at a meeting of the Standing Finance Committee with the permission of the Chairperson.
- vii) The proceedings of the meeting of the Standing Finance Committee shall be recorded in a Minute Book to be maintained by the Member-Secretary for the purpose after it is approved by the Chairperson of the meeting.

4. MEETING OF THE BOARD OF STUDIES

- i) The Member-Secretary shall send to the members notice of every meeting of the Board of Studies at least 14 days in the case of an ordinary meeting and at least 7 days in the case of an extraordinary meeting, before the date of the meeting, under certificate of posting, or by speed post or by email. The agenda of the meeting shall be sent at least 5 days before the date of the meeting.
- ii) Any member desirous of moving any resolution at a meeting of the Board of Studies shall give notice thereof in writing to the Chairperson so as to reach him/ her not less than 4 days before the date of such meeting. Such notice, when received, shall be circulated immediately to the members and shall be included in the agenda of the meeting.
- iii) The Chairperson of the Board of Studies shall preside over the meeting of the Board of Studies. In his/her absence, a member chosen by the members present on the occasion shall function as the Chairperson of the meeting.
- iv) Any matter not included in the agenda, may be considered at a meeting of the Board of Studies with the permission of the Chairperson.
- v) The proceedings of the meetings of the Board of Studies shall be recorded in a Minute Book to be maintained by the Member-Secretary for the purpose after it is approved by the Chairperson of the meeting.



Minutes of the SREC meeting conducted on 7th January 2022

The Student Research Ethics Committee (SREC) met on 7th January 2022 via WebEx, to review the SREC applications submitted by students Mr. Prashant Bhimrao Dongardive, Mr. Shubham Kumar, Mr. Mohai Menul Biswas, Mr. Papai Barman, Ms. Pragati Dattatraya Ubale, Mr. Arish Qamar, and Mr. Soumendu Sen.

All the applications have been approved in principle by the SREC committee subject to the condition that the revised applications will be submitted by the students based on the suggestion given by the committee.

The following are the specific suggestions and clarifications given to each student.

Suggestions/ clarifications given to Mr. Prashant:

1. The researcher must prepare an SOP specifying the precautions to be taken for conducting fieldwork in the context of Covid-19 to the SREC committee.
2. In item no 20, the student has mentioned consent will be taken for written, oral and audio-visual. The researcher may explain the additional benefits by mentioning audio visual consent.
3. The consent form may be reduced by giving specific focus to privacy, confidentiality, voluntary participation, and harm reduction

Suggestions/ clarifications given to Mr Shubam Kumar

1. The researcher has to elaborate the protocols to be followed while collecting biomarker information especially glucometer and procedure for disposing biomarker
2. Mention the minimum qualification, experience of investigators used for biomarker data collection and the type of training to be provided to investigators
3. As data will be collected by both researcher as well as investigator, in item no. 25, both researcher and investigator has to be ticked
4. In consent form the following has to be added:
 - (i) the researcher should mention that he will be collecting biomarker in consent form, also
 - (ii) if there are any benefits the respondents get by providing biomarker
 - (iii) the health investigator may inform the respondents about their level of Blood Pressure and Glucose
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of guide has to be mentioned



Minutes of the SREC meeting conducted on 20th April 2022

The Student Research Ethics Committee (SREC) met on 20th April 2022, 2.30 pm to review the SREC applications submitted by students namely (i) Mr. Vinodh Thota, (ii) Mr. Inakoti Veera Prasad, (iii) Ms. Manisha, (iv) Ms. Ravita Yadav, (v) Ms. Sarita Sonwani, (vi) Mr. Muhammad Rishad A. P., (vii) Dr. Sawankumar Somwanshi, (viii) Dr. Ratheesh Mon P, and (ix) Ms. Himani Sharma.

There were a total of nine application forms, of which only **seven** of the applications have been approved in principle by the SREC committee subject to the condition that the revised applications will be submitted by the students based on the suggestion given by the committee. The following are the specific suggestions and clarifications given:

1. Mr. Vinodh Thota: Approved with the following suggestions/ clarifications

2. Please explain the methodology of selecting 200 NSV users from two districts
3. There is a chance of covert use among NSV users, please explain how to address this issue
4. How the age group is defined?
5. Selection criteria is not clear: Both criteria mentioned are not qualified as exclusion criteria, non-response cases and incapacitated respondents do not include in exclusion criteria. Please edit it.
6. Getting record for the last 10 years from the health facility may not be feasible
7. The researcher has to address the ethical concerns in data collection as medical officers are not supposed to give information on anyone
8. In point no 12 (f), the student mentioned that there is no previous studies, however, a plenty of studies are available on this topic. The researcher has to modify this part.

2. Mr. Inakoti Veera Prasad: Approved with the following suggestions/ clarifications

1. It is not clear whether parent's consent will be taken for participants aged less than 18 years
2. Along with inclusion criteria, the researcher may add some of the exclusion criteria also
3. What benefit study participants are expected from the study?
4. What are the mechanism to ensure harm reduction?
5. In point no 12 (f), the student mentioned that there are no previous studies. There are a plenty of studies and hence, the student must add some references
6. Please explain the term community behaviour as it has direct association with study protocols and ethical concerns



3. Ms. Manisha: Approved with the following suggestions/ clarifications

1. Exclusion criteria specified by researcher does not look relevant: second part of inclusion criteria needs to be corrected
2. What are the mechanism to protect cross regional brides from potential harms due to participation in this study?
3. In point no 12 (f), the student mentioned that there are no previous studies. There are a plenty of studies and hence, the student must add some references
4. Committee does not agree with the comment on “no risk” of the study

The committee advise the student to revise the different columns of application form and submit

4. Ms. Ravita Yadav: Not approved as the application form is incomplete

1. The researcher has to include the clause voluntary participation in consent form
2. Explain how the study will benefit the participants?
3. Details of student and guide has to be added in consent form. The student has to modify the format of the consent form of KI
4. In point no 12 (f), the student mentioned that there are no previous studies. As there are a plenty of studies, the student must add some references
5. The application form is incomplete, resubmit the application with the proper corrections

5. Ms. Sarita Sonwani: Not approved as the application form is incomplete

1. Lack of consistency between title and objectives
2. Definition of migrants in this study has to be included; researcher has to mention whether it is short term or long term migrant
3. the age group mentioned is 15-59 years, hence, if the unmarried respondents aged less than 18 years are included, guardian’s consent is required. The researcher has to explain this in the form
4. Without understanding the detailed methodology of the study, and data collection process, it is not possible for the committee to review the application
5. There are several errors and inconsistency which needs to be corrected and resubmitted.

6. Mr. Muhammad Rishad A. P.: Approved with the following suggestions/ clarifications

1. In point no 17, it is mentioned that age group is 21 to 80+, the researcher must give explanation on why this particular age group is selected



7. **Dr. Sawankumar Somwanshi: Approved with the following suggestions/ clarifications**

1. Guide's signature is required in consent form
2. Consent form should be in prescribed format
3. In the application form, some of the points are incomplete. For instance, point no. 18 (a), 21 and 22 are blank. The student has to complete the application form
4. As suggested during proposal presentation, the word "impact" may be replaced by "implications"
5. In point no 12 (f), the student mentioned that there are no previous studies. There are a plenty of studies and hence, the student must add some references

7. **Dr. Ratheesh Mon P: Approved**

8. **Ms. Himani Sharma: Approved with the following suggestions/ clarifications**

1. The researcher should try to analyse the remittances in a better way. The researcher should conceptualize the problem by taking the duration of out-migration into account.
2. The researcher should only focus on male labour migrants and no seasonal migrants should be included.
3. The researcher should try to study what is happening at the household level and other than the household level. What about the production-related expenditure? Whether they are spending remittances on agricultural activities or any economic activities? Thus, the study of utilisation of remittances should not be confined to only household consumption patterns. The researcher must study both consumptions as well as expenditure on economic activities/ production for in-depth study.
4. The researcher can compare among different categories of households i.e., remittance-receiving households, remittances not-receiving migrant households and non-migrant households.
5. The researcher should give more focus to the expenditure on healthcare utilization, nutrition and education.

Guidelines for Travel Grant to Foreign Countries for IIPS Faculty Members

The IIPS encourages its faculty members to present their research papers in international conferences/seminars. Subject to availability of funds and merit of the (unpublished) research paper, Institute may consider partial/full support to participate in international conferences/seminars. The broad guideline for the same are as follows:

1. Travel grant is permissible only for the faculty members who are currently serving in the Institute and not in any long term leave (more than six months) at the time of application.
2. Travel grant application will be considered only for those faculty members who are continuously serving in the Institute for three or more years.
3. Travel grant is permissible only for oral presentation of research paper.
4. **Preferences of application for full travel grant will be preferred for PAA, APA, IUSSP and ICFP conferences.**
5. Faculty members must not avail full scholarship/grant from elsewhere on same heading.
6. Travel grant will be awarded as per Institute's rules.
7. Travel grants are permissible broadly under two categories: (a) Partial grant (maximum up to US\$500 to support miscellaneous expenses); and (b) Full grant (support exceeding US\$500). Full grant will be permissible only once in three years.
8. Those who wish to avail the travel grant for conference/seminar must submit their complete research paper along with an application in prescribed format (attached here).
9. Paper already presented/published elsewhere should not be submitted for travel grant.
10. Application for travel grant must be submitted 30 days prior to the scheduled conference/seminar.
11. **Those applying for full grant need to make a presentation**
12. Application may be submitted to Director's Office.
13. Institute reserves the right to consider/dismiss any application.
14. Application should be submitted with the full paper.

BYE-LAWS

(Corrected upto June 2008)

In exercise of the powers conferred by Rule 6(5) of the Rules and Regulations of the International Institute for Population Sciences, the Executive Council hereby makes the following Bye-Laws, namely:

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR POPULATION SCIENCES

BYE-LAWS "1967"

PART I - GENERAL

1. Short title and commencement:

1. These Bye-Laws may be called the International Institute for Population Sciences Bye-Laws, 1986.
2. They shall be deemed to have come into force on 19-12-1986.

2. Definitions:

In these bye-laws, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (a) "GENERAL COUNCIL" means the General Council of the International Institute for Population Sciences;
- (b) "EXECUTIVE COUNCIL" means the Executive Council of the International Institute for Population Sciences appointed under Rule 5 of the Rules and Regulations, to assist the General Council and to manage the day to day affairs of the Institute;
- (c) "PRESIDENT" means the President of the General Council of the International Institute for Population Sciences;
- (d) "VICE-PRESIDENT" means the Vice-President of the General Council;
- (e) "CHAIRMAN" means the Chairman of the Executive Council;

PART IV

CONSULTANCY AND FEE RULES AND MERIT PROMOTION

BYE-LAWS

13. Rules for Consultancy and Merit promotion Scheme

1. Consultancy and Fee Rules:

The rules for consultancy and acceptance of fee as framed by the Central Government under F.R.s. 46 and 47 S.R.s. 9 to 12, amended from time to time will apply mutatis mutandis to the members of the staff. (The consultancy and fee rules as approved by the Executive Council at its meeting held on July 15, 1974 be treated as repealed).

14. Miscellaneous

1. Unless in any case it is provided otherwise, the whole time of an employee shall be at the disposal of the Institute. He may be employed in any manner required by the appropriate authority without claim for additional remuneration.
2. The Institute shall observe such holidays as are observed by the Secretariat of the Government of India for its offices located in Mumbai and such other holidays as may be determined by the Executive Council.
3. In respect of matters not provided in the Rules and Regulations and the Bye-laws of the Institute, as amended from time to time, the rules applicable to Central Government servants regarding the general conditions of services, pay, allowances including travelling and daily allowances, leave salary, joining time, foreign service terms etc. and orders and decisions issued in this regard by the Central Government from time to time shall apply mutatis mutandis to the employees of the Institute.
4. The Executive council may make such variations from the provisions of the bye-laws in the case of special appointments as it may consider necessary.

Minutes of the Meeting of the IIPS Faculty Time Consultancy Fee Committee

The committee constituted for this purpose met on 23 May and 28 May, 2018 to discuss the existing norms for consultancy fee for faculty time and decide on the modalities for revising the compensation for faculty time in view of the implementation of 7th pay commission order. After detailed discussion, the following are the recommendations of the committee:

1. The existing norms for faculty time allow for monthly consultancy fee as per actual provision in each of the externally/outside funded projects subject to a maximum of three times basic pay of the concerned faculty in a financial year. The committee decided to maintain this norm by considering the revised basic pay of 7th CPC subject to and actual provision in externally/outside funded projects and a maximum of three times basic pay.
2. The committee further decided that the faculty time consultancy payment of the respective projects is subject to the following share of distribution. Of the total consultancy fee in the respective projects, the faculty time consultancy fee shall be distributed as follows:
 - a) Consultancy Fee to Faculty (project coordinator) – 75 %
 - b) Fee to Directly involved Officers
 - Director – 3%
 - AR (Admin) - 3%
 - Fee to AFO - 3%
 - c) Fee to Staff and Faculty who are not getting consultancy from outside/externally funded projects – 16 %
3. If for a particular faculty, consultancy fee for faculty time exceeds the limit of 3 times of basic pay at any time in the financial year, then his/her consultancy fees shall be transferred to category c) of item 2, that is "Fee to Staff and Faculty who are not getting consultancy fee from any outside/externally funded projects".
4. In view of maximum limit of three times basic pay of the faculty varying according to levels of pay for Assistant Professor, Associate Professor and Professor, the committee further decided that the total provision of consultancy fee in each project shall be shared subject to maximum of monthly consultancy fee of:
 - a) Rs.20000/- for Assistant Professor
 - b) Rs. 30000/ for Associate Professor
 - c) Rs. 40000/- for Professor.

If there is provision in the project for any amount in excess of this upper limit for the faculty, the remaining amount may be transferred to category 2 (c. Including this, the share of category 2 b) & c) together will range from 25 to 40 percent, depending upon the number of projects and provision of faculty time in the respective projects.

5. One third of each of the above consultancy fee shall be paid to Institute's Development Funds (IDF) before making any payment to teaching and non-teaching staff.
6. Faculty time consultancy fee shall be paid quarterly/monthly as per provision in the respective projects. In some projects, budgeted money may be received after a year or so. In such situations, faculty consultancy fee may be paid for the respective financial year as per project tasks performed during the particular financial year.
7. Fee for category 2 c) - other staff and faculty not directly involved in outside/externally funded projects shall be paid once/twice in year as per availability of funds. The available pool of money in category 2 (c) shall be distributed in the ratio of 0.75, 1.0 and 1.5 for Group C, Group B and Group A category staff. Any amount remaining in category 2 (c) in a year may be carried forward to the next year.
8. The faculty time consultancy fee may be revised upwards whenever basic pay is revised as per Government norms.

OFFICE ORDER

As per the decision of the Committee to Restructure the Academic Department and Suggest Improvement in Research/ Teaching/ Training Quality which has been duly approved by the Secretary vide letter dated March 4, 2021, it has been decided to set up two Research Centres within the Institute. They are:

- (i) Centre of Demography of Gender within the Department of Population and Development.
- (ii) Centre for Ageing within the Department of Family and Generation.

The Centre shall be viewed as a thematic area in which the members of faculty from different departments come together to take forward a theme of research. The activities of the Centre will be governed by the following broad principle:

1. Each Centre shall have One Head and an Associate Head. They will coordinate the activities of the Centre.
2. The activities of the Centre will be monitored by a Committee headed by Director and Sr. Professor. The other members of the Committee will be Head of the Concerned Department, Head and Associate Head of the Centre and a Professor nominated by the Director and Sr. Professor from outside the Department.
3. Centre is expected to be self-sustaining with the activities carried out largely from external funding.
4. A centre may submit its bi-annual activities in the IIPS Newsletter and a consolidated yearly report for the use of the Director's Report and Annual Report.
5. In case of any disputes on any matter either administrative or otherwise, the decision of the Director & Sr. Professor shall be final.
