## HARVARD SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

SUBAWARD RESEARCH AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") between the President and Fellows of Harvard College, on behalf of Harvard School of Public Health hereinafter referred to as "Harvard," and International Institute for Population Sciences, hereinafter referred to as "Collaborator" Harvard and Collaborator may hereinafter be referred to individually as a "Party," and/or collectively as the "Parties."

WHEREAS, Harvard has received funding from National Institutes of Health ("Prime Sponsor") in accordance with Grant No. R01 AG042778 (the "Prime Agreement"), for a research project entitled "The Longitudinal Aging Study in India", conducted under the direction of Dr. David Bloom (the "Harvard Investigator") herein incorporated by reference and attached hereto as Exhibit A;

WHEREAS, Harvard has received funding under the Prime Agreement and wishes to enter into this Agreement with Collaborator to perform research as defined herein;

WHEREAS, Collaborator is willing to perform such research in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth below:

WHEREAS, the research program contemplated by this Agreement is of mutual interest and benefit to Harvard and to the Collaborator, and will further the instructional and research objectives of Harvard in a manner consistent with its status as a non-profit, tax-exempt, educational institution.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

- STATEMENT OF WORK. Collaborator agrees to use reasonable efforts to perform the research program as described in Exhibit B (the "Research").
- PRINCIPAL INVESTIGATOR. Collaborator's performance of the Research will be supervised by Perianayagam Arokiasamy (the "Collaborator Investigator"). If the PI becomes unavailable then the representatives of the collaborating institutions mutually decide and agree replacement.
- PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE. The Research shall be conducted during the period 08/01/2013 (the "Starting Date") through 05/31/2014. The Completion Date may be extended only by mutual written agreement of the Parties. It is understood that Harvard may need to obtain authorization from the Prime Sponsor in order to grant Collaborator an extension.
- 4. REIMBURSEMENT OF COSTS. In consideration for this Agreement and the Research performed by Collaborator hereunder, Harvard shall pay to the Collaborator as per the agreed upon budget contained in Exhibit C (the "Budget") an amount not to exceed seven hundred three thousand and five hundred thirty nine dollars US (\$703,539). Harvard assumes no obligation to reimburse costs in excess of the Budget. Collaborator shall not be obligated to continue performance once it has expended the funds allotted provided it has exerted its good faith efforts to complete the Research within the Budget.
- PAYMENT. Upon full execution of this Agreeement, 50% of the funds will be provided to the Collaborator.
   The remaining funds will be paid upon submission of approved invoices. Collaborator shall submit a brief description of work performed within the billing period with each invoice. Collaborator shall submit

- 26. MODIFICATION. No modification or waiver of this Agreement or of any covenant, condition or limitation herein contained shall be valid unless in writing and executed by duly-authorized representatives of both Parties. A failure by one of the Parties to this Agreement to assert its rights under, including upon any breach or default of, this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such rights. No such failure or waiver in writing by any one of the Parties hereto with respect to any rights shall extend to or affect any subsequent breach or impair any right consequent thereon.
- 27. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Agreement is or becomes invalid or is ruled invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction or is deemed unenforceable, it is the intention of the parties that the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected.
- 28. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE/ RELATION TO OTHER AGREEMENTS. The Agreement is subject to all the terms and conditions of the Prime Agreement, and other special terms and conditions attached and incorporated by reference herein. In the event of any inconsistent or incompatible provisions, this Agreement, shall take precedence, followed by the terms of the Prime Agreement. For the avoidance of doubt, Collaborator hereby acknowledges and agrees to be, to the fullest extent, bound by any and all of the applicable terms and conditions set forth in the aforemention agreements.
- COUNTERPARTS. This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, and by facsimile or
  electronic transmission, each of which will be deemed to be an original, but all of which together
  constitute one and the same instrument.
- 30. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. Unless otherwise specified, this Agreement and its Exhibits embody the entire understanding between Harvard and Collaborator for the Research, and any prior or contemporaneous representations, either oral or written, are hereby superseded. No amendments or changes to this Agreement, including without limitation, changes in the statement of work, total estimated cost, and period of performance, shall be effective unless made in writing and signed by authorized representatives of the Parties.

## SUBCONTRACT AGREEMENT

Made and entered into by and between

## THE UNIVERSITY OF CAPE TOWN

A university incorporated in terms of the Higher Education Act. 1997, and the statute of the University of Cape Town, promulgated under Government Notice No. 1199 of 20 September 2002, herein represented byRoger Wallace, in his capacity as Contracts Manager of the University of Cape Town and he being duly authorised thereto

(hereinafter referred to as "UCT")

and

horein represented by Professor F. Ram. in his capacity as the Director (hereinafter referred to as "IIPS")

(collectively hereinafter referred to as "the Parties" and individually as "the Party")

## PREAMBLE

WHEREAS UCT is the recipient of funding from the International Development Research Centre (the IDRC) in terms of an agreement concluded on 26 January 2014 for the study entitled: "Counting Women's Work: The gendered economy in the market and as home thereinafter referred to as the "Principal Agreement", attached hereto as Annexure "A"),

AND WHEREAS UCT wishes to subcontract certain of the services in terms of the Principal Agreement to IIPS and will make a portion of the Funding which it has received in terms of the Principal Agreement available to IIPS for their contribution towards the Project.

AND WHEREAS the Parties wish to establish an arrangement to govern the relationship between them "inter portes" on the basis of the terms and conditions contained hereinbolow

## NOW THEREFORE THE PARTIES HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS

## 1. INTERPRETATION

in this Agreement, unless the context otherwise indicates -

- 1.1. the headings to clauses of this Agreement are inserted for reference purposes only and shall not govern or affect the interpretation thereof.
- 1.2 any annexures to this Agreement form an integral pact hereof and words and expressions defined in this Agreement shall bear, unless the context otherwise requires the same meaning in such annexures.
- unless the context clearly indicates a contrary intention, words importing the singular shall include the plural and vice versa;
- 1.4 reference to any one gender shall include the other gender and any reference to a ristural person shall include a legal persona and vice versa;
- 1.5, where the day on or by which anything is to be done is not a pusiness day it shall be done on or by the first business day thereafter;
- 1.6 where any number of days is prescribed in this Agreement, these shall be reckeded as calendar days, exclusively of the first, inclusively of the last day unless the last day falls on a weekend or on a public holiday, in which case the last day shall be the next succeeding day which is not a weekend or a public holiday.

## 2. DEFINITIONS

- 2.1:1. In this Agreement, unless clearly inconsistent with or otherwise indicated by the context, the definitions set out herein below shall apply
- 2.1.2 "Agreement" shall mean the subcontract between the Parties captured in this document, together with any ennexures, which are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2.1.3 Background Intellectual Property means any intellectual property know-how, information, data and/ or material owned or controlled by a Party and throught into the Project, which has been created prior to the Effective Date or any intellectual property know-how information, data and/ or material owned.

or controlled by a Party which is subsequently incorporated into the Project from other related work.

- 2.1.4 "Confidential Information" means information that (a) relates to the Disclosing Party's past, present or future research, development, business activities, products, services and technical knowledge, relating to the Project, and (b) either has been identified in writing as confidential or is of such a nature or has been disclosed in such a way that it should be obvious to the Receiving Party that it is claimed as confidential.
- 2.1.5 "Disclosing Party" means either Porty when such Party is disclosing its Confidential Information to the other Party.
- 2.1.6 "Effective Date" shall mean! April 2015, notwithstanding the date of signatural the date of last signature by the Parties hereto.
- 2.1.7. "Funding" shall mean the funding obtained by UCT from the IDROin terms of the Principal Agreement, a portion of which shall be made available toliPS in terms of this Agreement.
- 2.1.8 "Intellectual Property" means all outputs of creative endeavour in any field that can be protected either statutority or not, within any jurisdiction, including but not limited to all forms of copyright, design right, whether registered or unregistered, patent, patentable material, trademarks, know-how, trade secrets, rights in databases, information, data, discoveries, mathematical formulae, specifications, diagrams, expertise, techniques, research results inventions, computer software and programs, algorithms, laboratory notebooks, business and research methods, actual and potential teaching and distance learning material, and such other items as the Parties may from time to time specify in writing.
- 2.1.9 "Principal Agreement" shall mean the Agreement and annexures thereto signed between UCT and the IDRC, and annexed hereto as Annexure "A".
- 2.1.10 "Project" shall mean the work to be conducted in terms of this Agreement, as set out in more detail in the Statement of Work annexed hereto as Annexure "B"
- 2.1.11 'Receiving Party' means either Party when such Party is receiving the Confidential Information of the other Party.
- 2 1 12 "IIPS's Principal investigator" shall mean Ladusingn Laishram.
- 2.1.13 "UCT's Principal Investigator" shall mean Morné Oosthuizen.
- 2.2 The words and phrases defined in the Principal Agreement shall bear the same meaning ascribed to them in this Agreement, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise. In the event of any conflict between the provisions of this Agreement and the Principal Agreement, the Principal Agreement shall prevail.

## 3. COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION

This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall remain in effect until 31 March 2016, unless terminated earlier in terms of Clause 16 (Sixteen) of this Agreement or unless extended by written modification of this Agreement.

## 4. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PARTIES

- 4.1 This Agreement does not authorise either Party to act as agent of the other Party, nor shall it represent that it in fact has such authority.
- 4.2 Neither Party shall have any authority to make statements, representations or commitments of any kind or take any other action binding on the other, except as specifically provided in this Agreement.
- 4.3 IIPS shall act as an independent contractorwith respect to the services rendered under the Project and shall exercise control, supervision, management and direction as to the method and manner of performing the services in accordance with this Agreement.
- 4.4.11 is expressly understood that IPS is an independent contractorand that neither IIPS nor anyone employed by IIPS shall be deemed for any purpose to be an employee, agent, partner, servant or representative of IIPS.

## 5. TECHNICAL SUPERVISION

IIPS's Principal Investigator shall report to UCT's Principal Investigator on the progress of the Project. In the event that IIPS's Principal Investigator ceases to work for IIPS, then the Parties shall endeavour to secure a suitable successor, falling which either Party shall be entitled to cancel this Agreement in accordance with the provisions contained in clause 17 of this Agreement on the basis that the failure to secure a suitable successor to replace IIPS's Principal Investigator shall be considered a breach of this Agreement.

## 5. OBLIGATIONS ON IPS

- 5.1. IIPS undertakesto carry out the deliverables in relation to the Project as set out in detail in Annexure "B" herete and shall carry out the services in relation to the Project in a professional and workmanlike manner in every respect. If at any time tiPS falls to perform the services in the manner and at the times set out in this Agreement, then IIPS shall immediately upon the request of UCT, at no additional cost to UCT, take all necessary steps as required in order to effectively complete the Project. The request by UCT of such measures shall be without prejudice to any other rights or remedies UCT may have under this Agreement.
- 6.2 IIPS undertakes that it has full knowledge and understanding of the Principal Agreement and of the services to be provided under this Agreement and shall be responsible for observing all applicable terms and conditions contained in the Principal Agreement.
- 6.3 Except as otherwise specifically provided for in this Agreement, the terms and conditions of the Principal Agreement shall similarly apply to this Agreement as between UCT and IIPS, so that IIPS shall have in respect of UCT and in relation of the services the same rights, benefits, duties, responsibilities, obligations and liabilities under this Agreement as UCT has in respect of the IDRC and in relation to the work under the Principal Agreement, UCT shall have in respect of IIPS and in relation to the services the same rights, powers and remedies, responsibilities, obligations and liabilities under this Agreement as the IDRC has in respect of UCT and in relation to the work under the Principal Agreement.

- 8.4 IPS shall be responsible for the management of the funds received from UCT and may only use the funds in accordance with the Statement of Work and the budget attached hereto as Annexure C and may not utilise the Funding for any purpose other than for the Project.
- 6.5. UCT or its nominated representative shall be entitled at any time, on reasonable prior notice, to inspect any books of account or other records, to ensure that the Funding is being used in accordance with the budget.

## 7. PAYMENT

- 7.1. A total amount of USS30 000shall be made available to IIPS for the duration of this Agreement. A budget setting out the breakdown of this amount is unnexed horsto as Annexure \*C\*.
- 7.2 Payments shall be rapide as follows:
  - 7.2.1 US\$15,000 on signature of this Agreement;
  - 7.2.2 US\$6,000in January 2015;
  - 7.2.3 USS9,000on delivery of the final technical financial and dissemination reports
- 7.3 Provided that the milestones set out in clause 7.2 have been met and all required documentation is submitted timeously and that same is approved, payments shall be made within 30 (thirty) days of receipt of an invoice from NPS.
- 7.4 UCT shall only be obliged to make payment to IIPS once it receives funding from the IDRC.
- 7.6 If for any reason UCT is dissatisfied with the performance of IIPS or the services provided, an appropriate sum may be withheld from any payment otherwise due. In such event, UCT shall identify the particular aspects of the performance or services with which it is dissatisfied together with the reasons for such dissatisfaction. Payment of the amount outstanding shall be made upon remedy of any unsatisfactory work or resolution of outstanding queries to the satisfaction of UCT.
- 7.6, fIPS shall be responsible for accounting to the appropriate authorities for income tax, VAT, or any other monies required to be paid by it in terms of income tax tegislation, or any other taw.

## 3. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

The liability of either Party for any breach of this Agroement, or arising in any other way out of the subject-matter of this Agreement, will not extend to loss of business or profit or to any indirect or consequential damages or losses. In any event, the maximum liability of either Party under or otherwise in connection with this Agreement or its subject matter shall not exceed the value of this Agreement.

## 9. INDEMNITY

Each of the Parties (each an Indemnifying Party) shall keep the other Party (each an Indemnified Party), both during and after the term of this Agreement, fully and effectively indemnified against all losses, damage, injuries, deaths, expenses, acrons, proceedings,

demands, costs and claims, including, but not limited to legal fees and expenses, suffered by the Indomnified Party or any third party where such loss, damage, injury or death is not the result of gress negligence or wilful misconduct of the Indemnifying Party or any of its representatives.

## 10. INSURANCE

- 10.1. Without limiting IIPS's liabilities under this Agreement, IIPS shall effect and maintain policies of insurance adequate to cover its liabilities and to fulfil any requirements of government or other appropriate bodies in accordance with, and to the extent applicable, the insurance provision of the Principal Agreement.
- 10.2. An insurance certificate showing compliance by IIPS with the insurance requirements of this Agreement shall, upon request, be provided to UCT within 15 (fifteen) days of such request being made.

## 11. CONFIDENTIALITY

- Each Party and its employees, agents and subcontractors shall hold in confidence and shall not disclose distribute, sell, copy, share or otherwise use any Confidential Information obtained by the other Party whilst undertaking the Project which relates to the other Party's employees, research, development, business affairs, records, processes, techniques or types of equipment, or patients where relevant, whether past, present or future, except as may be contemptated by this Agreement or authorised by the other Party in writing. Upon completion of its work under this Agreement, each Party and its employees, agents and subcontractoreshall return to the other Party all Confidential Information and all records or documents received from the other Party, including without being limited to, any and all copies thereof which may have been made.
- 11.2. Neither Party shall incur any obligation under this clause 11 (eleven) with respect to information which
  - 11.2.1 is already known to the Receiving Party, and not impressed already with any obligation of confidentiality to the Disclosing Party; or
  - 11.2.2 is or becomes publicly known without the fault of the Receiving Party, or
  - 11.2.3 is obtained by the Receiving Party from a third party in circumstances where the Receiving Party has no reason to believe that there has been a breach of an obligation of confidentiality owed to the Disclosing Party; or
  - 11.2.4 is independently developed by the Receiving Party, or
  - 11.2.5 is approved for release in writing by an authorised representative of the Disclosing Party, or

This Memorandum of Agreement made on 29 November, 2017, between the International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS), Govandi Station Road, Deonar, Mumbai-400 088 (hereinafter referred to as "IIPS") of the first part and Indian Council of Medical Research, V. Ramalingaswami Bhawan, Post Box No. 4911, Ansari Nagar, New Delhi - 110 029 (hereinafter referred to as "ICMR"), which expression shall, subject to the AGREEMENT, include its successors in business and permitted assignees of the second part.

Hereinafter referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties"

## 1. Introduction

The Department of Health and Family Welfare (DoHFW), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), Government of India (GOI) had appointed IIPS as the nodal implementing agency to conduct the National Family Health Survey (NFHS)-4 in 29 States and 6 Union Territories (UTs). The survey aimed at providing estimates of various health and family welfare indicators at the national, State and district levels for all 640 districts in the country. Knowing prevalence of HIV infection in the general population of the country was also one of the key components of this survey. IIPS, under direction from the DoHFW, identified six laboratories across the country, where the Dried Blood Spot (DBS) samples on filter paper cards were sent for HIV testing. All of these laboratories have already received DBS samples from NFHS-4 Field Agencies. All these laboratories are part of the Reference Laboratory Network created by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare under National AIDS Control Organization. These DBS had collected some additional blood spots, which can be used for some more research

studies provided they are kept properly and analysed accordingly. Since IIPS was asked to conduct surveys by DoHFW and DBS were collected out of that, the ownership of DBS lies with the DoHFW.

The state and national reference laboratories which are engaged by the MoHFW and IIPS, for conducting HIV testing in NFHS-4 are listed below:

- National AIDS Research Institute (NARI), Pune- Apex Lab
- National Reference Lab, National Center of Disease Control (NCDC), Delhi
- National Reference Lab, National Institute of Mental Health & Neurosciences (NIMHANS), Bengaluru
- National Reference Lab, School of Tropical Medicine (STM), Kolkata
- National Reference Lab, Christian Medical College (CMC), Vellore
- State Reference Lab, Sir JJ Hospital, Mumbai
- State Reference Laboratory, Kohima (SRL, Kohima)

NFHS-4 has collected nearly 208698 Dried Blood Spot(DBS) samples over the first and second phases of the survey. These DBSs are invaluable source of information. Since the State and national reference laboratories engaged for HIV testing are experiencing problems in storage of DBS for want of space, IIPS had planned to keep these DBS in Tata Memorial Institute, Mumbai for doing further studies based on remaining blood spots of these collected Samples. ICMR expressed its desire to do research on DBS collected by IIPS during NFHS-4 (2015-16). Since ICMR has dedicated space for storage of data and biological samples and facilities for conducting molecular epidemiology, biochemical, and serological studies and also the ICMR has trained personnel for laboratory work and has been involved and have expertise in medical research, IIPS agreed to enter into a MOU for having research collaboration with ICMR.

Accordingly, this Agreement is entered into the following broad purposes, as given below:

## 2. Purpose and Scope of Work

- (i) IIPS will share its collected data statistical expertise and will provide all DBS to ICMR The participating laboratories will be responsible for shipping DBS to ICMR and the concerned laboratories will bear the cost of such shipment as provided to them through the budget provided by IIPS to them.
- (ii) IIPS and ICMR will designate nodal officers so that full transfer of DBS from participating laboratories should take place amicably from laboratories to the ICMR destinations following all protocols.

- (iii) ICMR will provide the receipt to IIPS for the DBS received from the laboratories.
- (iv) ICMR will provide space for preserving these DBS at (-80 Deg C), shifted from reference laboratories, do medical research on the DBS and generate data of medical/ health importance by testing the DBS as per the requirements advised by Research Group Committee (RGC).
- (v) The two organisations IIPS and ICMR will form a Committee Namely Research Group Committee (RGC) which will go into resolving all the intricacies of research being carried out, formalities that are required to be addressed for preserving/ transferring the DBS at/ to ICMR, analyzing and dissemination of results
- (vi) ICMR will retrieve the need-based DBS only for doing research studies.
- (vii) DoHFW would be kept informed for all such activities in addition to through its members in RGC.
- (viii) ICMR will store the remaining DBS samples for additional 10 years after completion of research project jointly undertaken by IIPS and ICMR. Parties may also invite research project proposals from Indian Researchers/ Organizations for utilization of remaining DBS samples and extracted biomarkers. These proposals will be evaluated by the RGC
- (ix) Before the expiry of 10 years, RGC in consultation with DoHFW, may decide if the storage period of 10 years is to be extended further

## (x) Data Security and Protection

- (1) IIPS and ICMR herein called as "Parties" are required to maintain confidentiality, including unauthorized disclosure and unauthorized use of the data collected.
- (2) Parties will ensure strict compliance of all the data protection and security provisions during their storage, analysis and dissemination,
- (3) Requisite and secure data backup mechanisms will be built in by ICMR at each stage of data transfer.
- (4) Parties will keep the data in a safe and secured place till it is decided to delete/destroy data files/filled Schedules and activity logs. Parties should ensure that no other person/agency has access to the data and biomarkers collected in the NFHS-4.

## 3. Constitution of Research Group Committee (RGC) and functions

(a) ICMR in consultation with Director IIPS and DoHFW will form Research Group Committee (RGC) comprising of experts in molecular epidemiology which will include at least two faculties from IIPS, two scientists from ICMR and a representative from DoHFW. RGC will be Co-chaired by Director of IIPS and DG, ICMR.

- (b) RGC will propose/ scrutinize/ evaluate research projects/ proposals to produce results that would be of relevance. Any such research proposals will be duly informed to DoHFW. Obtaining Institutional Ethics Committee clearance to conduct such project will be the responsibility of concerned Institute (IIPS and ICMR). These research projects will be implemented at ICMR sites identified by RGC.
- (c) For any such research project representatives of DoHFW, IIPS and ICMR, will be part of the research team of the project. The contribution of DoHFW, IIPS and ICMR would be duly acknowledged in any such research results and publications.

## 4. Assignment to any other Party

The parties shall not unilaterally transfer or assign or sublet any part of this AGREEMENT wholly or partially or otherwise the conduct of said proposal to any other person, firm or company or any other institution/organization.

## 5. Amendments and Modifications

No revisions, modifications or change to this AGREEMENT shall be binding upon the parties until the same is acknowledged by the parties and agreed to it in writing.

## 6. Indemnity

Except where arising from the negligence of IIPS or ICMR, as the case may be, the parties concerned shall indemnify each other in respect of any cost or damages howsoever arising out of or related to breach of warranty or representation, AGREEMENT or statutory duty, or tortuous act or omissions by the parties concerned or their personnel, or any claims made against IIPS/ICMR as the case may be, by third parties in respect thereof.

## 7. Disputes and Arbitration for Amicable Settlement



#### 13. NON-EXCLUSIVE NATURE OF THIS MOU:

If the know-how developed as a result of the joint development programme leads to a patent or patents being taken, the parties hereto shall mutually agree whether or not to apply for a patent/patents and if so in which countries. 

It is an autonomous body under the Department of Atomic Energy, Government of India. TMC offers Ph.D programme life science and epidemiology and conduct clinical trials.

Whereas IIPS has approached TMC for collaborative work. International Institute for Population Sciences, is a Deemed University under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India. Established in 1956, IIPS is a premier Institute engaged in teaching and research in the area of demography. IIPS offers three Master's programme; Master of Arts/Science in Population Studies (M.A/M.Sc); Master of Biostatistics in Demography and Statistics (MBD) and Master of Population Studies (MPS). Apart from these, M.Phil in Population Studies/Bio-Statistics and Ph.D in Population Studies/Biostatistics & Demography are offered by the Institute.

- f. Internship to IIPS Bio stats students/MPhil/PhD students at TMC and vice-versa.
- g. This MoU supersedes all the previous correspondence and discussions, understanding and agreement between the two parties on the subject pertaining to this MoU.





It is with great pleasure that I would like to confirm our cooperation and collaborative partnership on the project entitled "Burden of Disease and Deprivation in India across Micro and Macro Public Policy Units" based at Harvard University, of which I am the Principal Investigator with the International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS).
