

World Population Day

The Institute observed the World Population Day on 11th July, 2018 by organizing a symposium on the theme "Family Planning is a Human Right". On behalf of the organizers, Prof. S.K Mohanty welcomed the guests and gave a brief introduction of the theme of the Symposium and the invited speakers of the day. Professor P. Arokiasamy, Acting Director of the day, chaired the function. Dr. U.S. Mishra (Professor, CDS), Dr. Shamala Dupte (FPAI) and Dr. S.K. Singh (Professor, IIPS) were the invited speakers.

Prof. Mishra delivered a talk on the "World Population Day: A Reminder or Resolve?" He raised the concern on women's gains with the declining fertility rates and role of population dynamics and demographers in the policy formation. Dr. Dupte conversed on 'Family Planning as a human right and the evolution of Family Planning Programmes'. Prof Singh delivered his talk on "Repositioning of Family Planning Programme in India: Issues and Strategies Emerging from NFHS-4". At the end, Dr. Preeti Dhillon thanked the speakers and audience. Prof. S.K. Mohanty and Dr. Preeti Dhillon were the coordinator of the symposium.



The Eleventh Professor P.N. Mari Bhat Memorial Lecture was held on 18 December, 2018, and Dr. Christophe Z. Guilmoto, Senior Fellow in Demography at the French Institut de Recherche pour le Développement (IRD), Paris, delivered the lecture on "Sex imbalances at birth: today and tomorrow" on the occasion. Prof. K.S. James, Director and Senior Professor, IIPS, chaired the session. In his lecture Dr. Guilmoto highlighted that the issues of sex imbalances in current situation and spatial dependence of sex imbalances at birth. He stated that sex ratios at birth (SRB) rose from 105 male births per 100 female births (normal level) towards 110-130 (5 to 25% excess male births) since the 1980s. Affected countries are clustered in East and South Asia, South Caucasus and Southeast Europe. The increase is caused mostly by sex selective abortions: prenatal sex diagnosis (ultrasound) followed by abortion of female foetuses. Meanwhile, females are also missing due to excess female mortality both in childhood and adulthood. He pointed out that all sex ratio imbalances display very strong spatial patterns (usually stronger than those of other demographic features). This spatial dependence can be construed as the product of other unobserved locally grounded features such as gender systems and a pure spatial effect of hot spots and diffusion. The stability of these spatial patterns has important implications over a long period and spatial diffusion a likely predictor of future changes. He stated that the SRB initially tends to oscillate around 105. After which, it may rise, but it never drops below 105. When it rises, it does so continuously. It then tends to stabilize around a plateau level. Never goes beyond 120 in countries or 130 in regions. It never rebounds after reaching a first plateau. It usually *drops after stabilization* and may return to normalcy. National SRB levels in large countries are often the composite product of distinct regional trajectories. Structural determinants of SRB like fertility decline, technology or son preference are well-established. Future declines are likely to be caused by decline in son preference, yet, the role of policy interventions remain poorly understood, the impact of fertility rebounds remain to be investigated, events triggering the rise (and the turnaround) may

remain somewhat contingent and unpredictable. SRB profiles (inverted U-shaped) tend to be similar across countries and may help predict downturns. We need to understand the tempo (calendar) and quantum (intensity) of the sex ratio transition. Heterogeneity within countries leads to different regional or social SRB trajectories, complicating forecasting. Strong spatial dependence should help to predict future spread within countries.

Global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS-4)

Launched in 1999 as a joint collaboration of WHO and CDC, the Global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS) is a global standard for systematically monitoring youth tobacco use (smoking and smokeless) and tracking key tobacco control indicators. It is a school-based survey, designed to enhance the capacity of the countries to monitor tobacco use among youth students (aged 13-15 years). It is one of the largest public health surveillance systems, with surveys conducted in more than 188 countries/sites. It is an important tool to assist countries in supporting WHO MPOWER, a package of six evidence-based demand reduction measures contained in the WHO's Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC). In India, three rounds of GYTS was previously conducted in 2003, 2006 and 2009.

GYTS-4 in India is a national level school based tobacco survey which focuses on adolescents aged 13–15 years. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), Government of India has assigned IIPS as a nodal agency to conduct GYTS-4. The survey will be conducted during 2019. The World Health Organisation (WHO) is providing technical support for this survey. IIPS has initiated the preparatory process in November, 2017 and formally started the actual activities from April, 2018.

GYTS-4 Specific Objectives:

- To determine the level of tobacco, use by State/UTs, residence and sex (urban/rural).
- To estimate the age of initiation of cigarette and *bidi* smoking and smokeless tobacco.
- To estimate the exposure to second hand smoking (SHS).
- To estimate the exposure to tobacco advertising.

• To assess the extent to which major prevention programmes are reaching school-based populations and establish the subjective opinions of these populations regarding such intervention.

Sampling Design:

Total sample size for GYTS-4 in India is proposed to be 100,000 students from about 1000 schools across the states and UTs. The classes/standards to be covered are 8th, 9th and 10th standards belonging to age 13-15 age group. The total sample size of 100,000 will be selected based on probability proportional to size (PPS) on logarithmic scale ensuring the consideration of size as well as geographical spread of the population. GYTS-4 follows multi-stage geographically clustered sampling design.

GYTS-4 Progress of Activities:

The Proposal of GYTS-4 was approved by MoHFW in March, 2018. Selection and recruitment of staff for the project has been completed by May 2018. On 24th July 2018, the first Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) meeting was held. In this meeting procedure for selection of field agencies for the survey was discussed. There was also preliminary discussion on questionnaire and sampling procedure.

Soon after TAC-1, GYTS-4 questionnaires were revised in accordance with the suggestions and comments received from WHO and the MoHFW. The GYTS-4 has two types of Questionnaires: (A) School Policy Questionnaire (about 10 short questions for heads of schools) and (B) Student's Questionnaire (about 70 questions). Approval of the Questionnaires from Institutional Review Board (IRB) of IIPS was obtained on 31st August 2018. On 11th September 2018, second TAC Meeting was held, during which detailed discussion on sampling procedure and finalizing of questionnaires took place. After TAC-2, drafting of the Request for Proposal (RFP) for selection of Field Agencies (FAs) was carried out and the ministry's approval has been received. The final GYTS-4 questionnaires have been translated into Hindi and Marathi.


The District Information System for Education (DISE) data has been used for sampling frame and preparation of school list. Sampling and selection of schools for various states have been performed according to WHO recommended sampling methodology.

The first draft of Field Manual has also been completed and preparation for pre-test of the questionnaires begun from mid-November 2018. Permission from nearby schools was obtained and pre-test was conducted in the first week of December in few selected schools in Mumbai. Currently, the Request for Proposal (RFP) for selection of Field Agencies (FAs) has been finalized, and the same has been floated on IIPS Website, newspapers, and other government sites.

Causes and Consequences of Out-Migration from Middle Ganga Plain

Middle Ganga Plain situated in between foothills of Himalaya from north and peninsula edge from south. It covers a large physical area (approx. 144,409 sq km) with an immense human, cultural and economic significance for the country. It comprises of two different administrative divisions (UP- 27 districts and Bihar- 37 districts) but identical cultural and economic pattern provides unity and coherence to this region and a geographical personality. Within the region there are six physio-cultural regions, which differ in terms of socio-economic and cultural practices. Migration from this region has been deeply rooted since past two centuries. In post LPG reform period, both internal and international migration and role of remittances in household livelihood have become predominant feature. The innovation in IT and communication has further added new dimensions in the migration studies.

The Dept. of Migration and Urban Studies, with an objective to develop a comprehensive understanding about migration phenomenon and lives of the people living in migrant sending villages from Middle Ganga Plain, has been working on a institute-sponsored project entitled, "Causes and Consequences of Out-Migration from Middle Ganga Plain" since 2016. First phase of field work has been completed with collection of data from more than 2250 households spread across 36 villages and 17 districts in Bihar in July 2018. The training was organized in AN Sinha Institute of Social Studies, Patna. Data was collected in CAPI for which software has been developed in house. Training of Investigators and fieldwork of Second Phase in eastern UP is scheduled from February 2019. The coordinators of project are: Dr. Archana K Roy, Prof R.B Bhagat, Prof K.C Das, Mr. Sunil Sarode and Dr. R.S. Reshmi.

Internal meeting with experts



A Two-day review meeting to finalise indicators for the midline survey factsheet of Swabhimaan and discuss longitudinal study proposal was organized at IIPS, Mumbai during 9-10 January 2019. A workshop on Introduction to R and Spatial Analysis with R Model Approaches, Maps, and Big Geodata

The International Institute for Population Sciences conducted a six-day workshop on "Introduction to R and Spatial Analysis with R Model Approaches, Maps, and Big Geodata" during August 20-25, 2018 in collaboration with the Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research, Rostock, Germany, and the Federal Institute for Population Research, Wiesbaden, Germany. Thirty-six persons were selected to attend the workshop from among 218 applications from the research scholars and professionals working in the universities, research institutions, government and non-government organizations.

The workshop was coordinated by Prof. Usha Ram, Dr. Sebastian Klüsener and Mr. Anjani Kumar Mishra. Prof. Sebastian Klüsener was the resource person for the workshop. The course typically comprised of classroom lectures during the pre-lunch sessions and hands on exercise during post-lunch sessions. Three volunteer facilitated the resource person during the post-lunch practice sessions. During the workshop, an **e-group** was created to foster interactions between participants and resource persons and to help each other on a sustainable basis even after the completion of the workshop participants. The group is very active and participants find it extremely useful. On the last day of workshop, all the participants and volunteers were given a certificate of participation for their successful completion of the workshop. The workshop training materials consisting of R-syntax and commands, referred datasets and power point presentations, etc. were made available for use and self-learning to all the faculty, research staff and students of IIPS.

Workshop on 'Triple Burden of Malnutrition in India: are we heading towards a human capital crisis?'

On October 8, 2018, the University of Sydney (USYD) and International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS) jointly organized a workshop on triple burden of malnutrition in India - coexistence of undernutrition, overweight/obesity and micronutrient deficiency in the same population, community, household, or individuals. The workshop aimed to bring together experts from various disciplines - economics, nutrition, health; as well representatives from NGOs and the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare to assess what has been done and brainstorm what can be done to address the concerns with multiple burdens of malnutrition in the country. A key conclusion of the day-long discussion was that multiple burdens of malnutrition is indeed an emerging problem in our country, a particular area of concern being the rising overweights among rural residents. Interestingly, exploratory analysis reveals that dual burden of nutrition in India is dominant in middle-to-upper income households. Interdisciplinary and intersectoral efforts are crucial in tackling the problem. Complexity of the issue also calls for increasing synergy between academia and policymakers to better understand the various causal forces and accordingly design effective interventions. The workshop was funded by the India Development Fund of the Office of Global Engagement, USYD.


Workshop on Meta Analysis

Aiming to provide an intense training on Meta-Analysis to postgraduates (MA, MSc and PhD scholars), a one-day workshop on 'Meta-Analysis' was held on 17 October, 2018 in the campus. The main objective was to teach one of the quantitative, formal, epidemiological study designs used to systematically assess the

results of previous research to derive conclusions about that body of research. Dr. Geetha R. Menon, Scientist E, ICMR-National Institute of Medical Statistics ICMR Campus, New Delhi delivered a lecture on "Introduction and Application of Meta-Analysis". Around 100 research scholars attended the workshop in two different sessions. The workshop was organised by PhD Co-ordinator, Prof. Sayeed Unisa, Department of Mathematical Demography & Statistics.

Department of Extra Mural Studies and Distance Education-Contact Programme

The Department of Extra Mural Studies and Distance Education organized a one-week Contact Programme for the MPS/MA Distance Leaners at the Institute during December 3-7, 2018. Twenty-two Distance Learners (4 MPS and 18 M.A. course) attended the contact programme. The Contact Programme is usually conducted once in a year, i.e., in the month of June every year. Traffic police and local police were present to ensure that there is no disturbance by the regular traffic. The faculty members and the supporting staff belong to diverse interdisciplinary background with specialisation in some core areas of population sciences, trained in India and abroad.

The Institute is the hub of population and health related teaching and research in India, playing a vital role for planning and development of the country. During the past years, students from different countries of Asia and the Pacific region, Africa and North America have been trained at the Institute. The alumni are occupying prestigious positions at national and international organisations, universities and colleges and non-governmental reputed organisations.

The Institute offers seven different Post-Graduate, Doctoral, and Post-Doctoral courses with scholarships/fellowships from the GoI. Admission for the academic session 2018-19 has been announced.
